What is Legionella?

Legionella are bacteria that can cause a serious lung infection called Legionnaires' disease. People can get sick when they inhale water droplets that contain the bacteria.



How does Legionella affect water systems?

Legionella bacteria grow naturally in the environment and in water. They can also grow in building water systems. Buildings with large water systems, like hotels, may be more likely to grow Legionella. If the bacteria are present, they can be spread through aerosols produced by: hot and cold water systems, showerheads, decorative fountains, hot tubs, cooling towers, and more.



Why should you care?

Legionella can potentially grow and spread in building or recreational water systems that can often result in a large number of guests getting sick affecting your business's reputation and income.



What can you do to prevent *Legionella* and other waterborne diseases?

You can protect your guests, staff, and business by assessing your water system and learning about water management programs. Using a water management program can help identify potential hazards in your water system to prevent the growth and spread of harmful bacteria.



Recreational Water Illnesses - What You Should Know.

Preventing recreational water illnesses (RWIs) is possible when operators, patrons, and local health departments work together to ensure compliance with rules and regulations for permitted establishments. Absence or low levels of sanitizing residual in pools, spas, splash pads, and other types of recreational water can result in the spread germs that cause diarrhea as well as skin and respiratory RWIs.
